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ASLF wins top honor for Bruce A Restart

OAKVILLE – November 1, 2004 – The Acres-Sargent & Lundy-Fox Joint Venture (ASLF) received the 2004 Schreyer Award for its work on the restart of Units 3 and 4 at Bruce Power's Bruce A Nuclear Generating Station. The project was chosen from a record 64 entries for its significant technical and managerial achievements.

"This complex and multi-faceted contract could only have been successfully completed through teamwork, commitment and expertise," said Duncan Hawthorne, Bruce Power's President and Chief Executive Officer. "The relationship with ASLF played a significant role in the return of 1,500 MW of emission-free energy to Ontario."

The Schreyer Award is Canada's highest distinction for consulting engineers. The 36-year-old Canadian Consulting Engineering Awards are co-sponsored by *Canadian Consulting Engineer* magazine and the Association of Consulting Engineers of Canada (ACEC) and pay tribute to outstanding achievements in nine categories. The Schreyer goes to the most outstanding work overall, regardless of category.

ASLF's breakthrough work for Bruce Power included engineering and procurement, and the construction of 45 different modification projects over five million work hours. Individual assignments ranged from the maintenance and overhaul of existing equipment to the provision of two key safety systems – a Secondary Control Area and a 4.4-MW Qualified Power Supply.

Acres Vice President Alan O'Brien said that "working on this project was a major highlight of my career" and called the award "a fitting conclusion to three years of exceptional teamwork".

The award was judged by a panel of distinguished engineers from across Canada, not engaged in the practice of consulting engineering, and was presented during the ACEC's annual gala at Chateau Laurier in Ottawa on October 28. ACEC's membership consists of approximately 600 independent consulting engineering firms and 11 regional organizations. Members conduct business in every province and territory, with many also having extensive international experience.

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
